- The Program is designed to teach youth the fundamentals of playing sports and facilitate a general understanding of various games, such as:
 - Baseball/Softball, Soccer, Basketball, Football, Field Hockey, Kickball, Dodge Ball, Volleyball, Track and Field, etc.





• The Program:

- Serves to challenge youth physically/mentally
- Aids in fostering team spirit
- Promotes healthy competition
- Conditions discipline
- Develops citizenship and good sportsmanship
- Builds youth of strong moral character
- Focuses on physical fitness, exercise, nutrition, and overall health and wellness

• Youth are required to:

- Sign-in and out
- Wear appropriate attire
- Engage in character education learning exercise
- Maintain a program journal
- Participate in warm-up exercises
- Learn basic fundamentals of various sports
- Compete in supervised drills and pseudo-games environments
- Exhibit good citizenship and sportsmanship
- Reflect on what was learned and/or experienced
- Clean-up and groom the field each time after use

- Respect coaches, volunteers, participants, equipment and facilities
- Practice honesty at all times not lie, cheat or steal
- Use proper language and exhibit good behavior


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

THE SHINE PROGRAM...Sports Helping Influence Neighborhood Excellence



The Sports Helping Influence Neighborhood Excellence (SHINE) program, an after-school program advocating sportsmanship, citizenship, academics, physical fitness, wellness and nutrition is a Weed and Seed program in partnership with the Housing Authority of the City of Yuma (HACY) and G.W. Carver Elementary School. Over 100 youth have signed up for the program that meets Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30pm to 5:30pm. Almost seventy participants show up each day to participate. The program targets 4th-6th graders. The youth participate in softball, kickball, basketball, soccer, and calisthenics, to name a few.

Participants also learn nutrition, sportsmanship, the importance of academics, citizenship, honesty, integrity and to work as a team !

PROGRAM FOR YOUTH **KEEPS ITS SHINE**

SHINE is an after-school sports program originally started in the Carver School in 2009, with the Department of Justice Weed and Seed funding and Housing

Authority of the City of Yuma (HACY) providing volunteer staffing. As SHINE starts its 6th season at Carver School this spring now there are programs at various schools including Yuma High and 4th Ave Jr. High with nearly 140 students from North End schools in participating the program.

Designed to promote constructive activities during critical and typically unsupervised after-school hours, this program teaches youth the fundamentals of playing sports and facilitates a general understanding of various sports, such as softball/baseball, soccer, basketball, football, etc. Additionally, this program challenges individuals physically and mentally, aids in fostering team spirit, promotes healthy competition while developing discipline, citizenship, sportsmanship in building youth of strong moral character.

The program is run by 14 volunteers and 1 fulltime staff member and is entirely financed by fundraising efforts. At each session participants receive a nutritious snack and beverage. They also receive a t-shirt, medal, and attend an end of year graduation. Once youth have graduated from the program they are eligible to return to be youth mentors

where they develop leadership skills and assist team coaches on the field. In the 2012-13 school year, there were 36 Mentors and 260 participants who graduated. One of the greatest contributors to the success of the program is offered to eligible youth in Yuma. It was the ongoing commitment of the HACY employee volunteers. Without them this program could not be run on a weekly basis. The continued support from local and national sponsors also ensures that the SHINE Program will keep growing to meet the needs of the community. On February 25, 2010 U.S. Attorney Dennis K. Burke toured the Carver Park Weed & Seed Community with Councilman and committee members Raul Mendoza, Clint Norred of Yuma Police Department and Andrea Roman, Community Resources Specialist.

The U.S. Attorney was given a tour of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Neighborhood Center, the community's Safe Haven. The Center provides a multitude of services from a teen center and resident computer lab to a multi-purpose rental facility. The facility is conveniently located within the Carver Park Community near Carver Park and Carver Elementary School. Youth and residents are able to walk to the facility for services, eliminating the need for transportation.



After touring the Safe Haven and the Carver Park Weed & Seed Neighborhood, the U.S. Attorney had the pleasure of attending the Sports Helping Influence Neighborhood Excellence (SHINE) youth program. SHINE is an after school youth program that was made possible by the Housing Authority of the City of Yuma (HACY) in partnership with Carver Park Weed & Seed Community and City of Yuma Neighborhood Services.

The program is offered to eligible Carver Park Weed & Seed youth as an alternative after school activity. Youth are taught physical fitness through various sports, exercise, nutrition and overall health and wellness. The U.S. Attorney spent some time with the youth encouraging their involvement and commitment to the program. The youth in turn greeted him with a very warm welcome. Yuma, Arizona.- Con la meta de seguir puliendo las habilidades y talentos deportivos de los niños del Condado de Yuma, el Programa SHINE invita a un Torneo de Softbol el próximo 31 de marzo y 1 de abril. "Otorgamos actividades extraescolares a las escuelas Salida Del Sol y Carver, donde tenemos más de 400 niños y niñas en deportes como soccer, béisbol, softbol, retos mentales y juegos en exteriores y al final del año les damos un certificado de participación", dijo.

Pero el esfuerzo no acaba en Yuma, ya que por medio del torneo de softbol desean invitar a más niños del Sur del Condado, para formar en esta siguiente etapa grupos en Somerton y seguir puliendo a los diamantitos que hay dentro de cada uno.

El torneo se llevará a cabo en el Complejo Deportivo Kennedy, ubicado en la calle Kennedy Lane y calle 23, en Yuma, para cual esperan recibir donaciones de empresas u organismos y proveer a los participantes de comida al final de la convivencia.

DRUG EDUCATION FOR YOUTH DEFY

DEFY-Drug Education for Youth is a Department of Justice funded program through Weed & Seed. The youth who participate in the program are boys and girls within 9-12 years of age The program includes two phases. The first phase involves a curriculum that must be followed which includes topics such as bullying and the ill effects of it, stay away from drugs and the harm they can cause you.

The second phase of DEFY involves a camp. This year's camp was held at the Salvation Army Boys & Girls Club. A huge collaboration effort was established with the Housing Authority of the City of Yuma (HACY). Also involved with the camp were the Yuma Young Marines staff, City of Yuma Neighborhood Services, the Salvation Army-Boys & Girls Club and Carver School.



The youth were treated to a movie the first night and were introduced to the logistics of DEFY, code of conducts, flag class, introduction to physical fitness, nutrition,




